The exhibit explores the radical vision of an artist who profoundly shaped modernist practice in Brazil. It surveys Tarsila's modernist paintings and ending with her large scale, socially driven works of the early 1930s. Central to the exhibition is the reunion of three landmark paintings: The Black Woman (1923), Abaporu (1928), and Anthropophagy (1929), a transformational series of works. She was born in 1886 in the rural town of Capivari, on the outskirts of São Paulo. Tarsila sought inspiration from her country, its landscape and people, blending the innovations of the European avant-garde with a Brazilian vernacular sensibility to produce a distinctive body of work that was as personal as it was novel.

Abaporu, which Tarsila painted in 1928 depicts an elongated figure with a blooming cactus. The title combines two words from the language of the Tupi-Guarani Indians: aba (man) and poru ("who eats human flesh"). Tarsila's painting became the banner for a transformative artistic movement that imagined a Brazilian culture arising from the symbolic digestion-or artistic "cannibalism"-of outside influences.
