



## Federation News: Coalition Formed In Suit Against Government

### Cuts in Mental Health Benefits for Federal Employees Blue Cross Severely Curtails Outpatient Payments

Washington: The National Federation has joined in a suit with the American Psychiatric Association, National Association of Private Psychiatric Hospitals, American Psychological Association and others against the Office of Personnel Management (OPM) and the Federal Government regarding the drastic cuts in mental health benefits in Federal Employee Health Benefits (FEHB) Program. This group provides health insurance coverage for all federal government employees.

#### Major Cuts

Larger than usual cuts by Blue Cross/Blue Shield in benefits were expected in 1982, but the actual changes were disastrous for mental health coverage. As of January 1, 1982 outpatient treatment is to be reimbursed at 70% of the usual and customary rates for high option subscribers (75% for low option subscribers). However, each high option beneficiary is entitled to reimbursement for only the *first* 50 outpatient visits (25 for low option), including visits to physicians for non-mental health treatment. In other words, if a high option subscriber sees his/her family physician twice during the year, his dermatologist 8 times, that leaves only 40 outpatient mental health visits eligible for reimbursement. Although, superficially, this appears equitable, since outpatient visits apply equally to mental and physical health services, there is in fact a disproportionate impact because each is a different mode of treatment. Unlike mental health treatment, there are few physical health problems which are treated on a weekly or more frequent basis.

This plan more recently provides that Blue Cross/Blue Shield will pay 100% of all outpatient services (*other than mental*

*health*) after the employee has incurred \$1000 of coinsurance payments (\$2500 for low option). This has been clarified to mean that once a subscriber has used up his/her 50 outpatient visits (25 for low option), *no* further reimbursement will be paid for outpatient care for *any kind of health service*.

Finally, Blue Cross/Blue Shield has reduced *inpatient* mental health coverage to 60 days per year (30 days for low option). In 1981, 365 days were covered.

#### Double Bind

We are fighting on two fronts simultaneously—in Congress and in court. Our national lobbyist, Ken Adams, advises that only Congress can provide a long-term solution to the problem of discrimination in reductions of mental health benefits in the FEHB program. If Congress amends the law to require explicitly equal coverage for mental and physical health, federal employees' benefits will be free of compromises and trade-offs which occur during the annual contract negotiations between FEHB insurance carriers and OPM.

Meanwhile, in court, Judge Thomas Flannery, on December 23, 1981, refused to issue an injunction to stop Blue Cross/Blue Shield and the Federal Government from implementing the outpatient and inpatient mental health benefit cuts described above. Judge Flannery's ruling was appealed on February 22. Adams says, "its difficult to be optimistic about getting relief from the courts in the absence of a stronger, more explicit statement by Congress in the form of amendments to the statute." This litigation, however, has established the National Federation as a legitimate voice on mental health

issues in Washington; this in itself is an important victory.

#### Medicare Update—S.2242

Senator Don Riegle (D-Mich.) has introduced a revised version of S.123 (the Inouye Bill permitting direct Medicare and Medicaid reimbursement to qualified clinical social workers, psychologists, psychiatric nurse practitioners). Several influential senators indicated last year that they supported expanding the range of Medicare/Medicaid providers to include non-physician mental health professionals, but they were concerned about the cost of increasing the reimbursement ceiling to \$1000 (as S.123 provides). With Senator Inouye's agreement, the bill was revised and was introduced as S.2242. We are now renewing efforts to enlist co-sponsors. National Federation will be convening a meeting with the other supporting mental health groups to develop a coordinated push for additional sponsors as well as to develop witnesses for committee hearings on this bill. □

The following is a guide for drafting an individualized letter. (Don't hesitate to ask friends, businessmen, union/fellow employees to write.):

I (we) urge you to support the passage of Bill A.4538-A (in the Assembly) or Bill S.3542-A (in the Senate), a bill to amend sections 162 and 253 of the Insurance Law, to provide for reimbursement under group health insurance contracts for mental health services rendered by duly qualified clinical social workers. Passage of this bill will result in greater access to quality mental health care and freedom of choice to consumers.

My experience in working as/with (su-

perceiving and/or teaching) clinical social workers has been that they are well trained and competent to provide psychotherapy.

The bill will also correct the inequitable and discriminatory system of reimbursing only the patients of psychiatrists and psychologists, while preventing reimbursement to patients of clinical social workers for the same services.

No new insurance mandates are proposed; this bill merely adds qualified clinical social workers to the list of those eligible for reimbursement.

# LEGISLATIVE EXCHANGE

With the reconvening of the legislature in January, efforts by Society lobbyists and parity committee members resulted in the re-introduction of the Society's bill with even more sponsors than last year.

The addition of Sen. Thomas Bartosiewicz (D.-Brooklyn) brought the number of Senate sponsors to 15. In the Assembly, A. Pinny Cooke, (R.-Rochester); Jerrold Nadler, (D.-New York City); and Carol A. Siwek, (R.-Buffalo) all joined as sponsors, raising the number in the lower house to 12. Sponsors of the bill cut across both major political parties and come from every area of the state.

After its re-introduction in February, the measure was referred to the respective insurance committees of both houses. The bill came before the Assembly Insurance Committee on March 9. An intensive two-day lobbying campaign took place in Albany on March 8 and 9. The Society's lobbyists, joined by members from the Metropolitan, Mid-Hudson and Queens chapters, converged in Albany.

More than 30 legislators and legislative aids were seen during the two-day period.

The turnout of members in Albany was the largest in recent years. These lobbying efforts helped push the bill through the Assembly Insurance Committee, the first of several hurdles that must be cleared before the measure reaches a floor vote. The bill has now been referred to the Assembly Ways and Means Committee, the next pressure point requiring intensive effort.

Society members are urged to coordinate plans through their local chapters and through the parity committee to visit members of the Assembly Ways and Means Committee and the Senate Insurance Committee. Arthur J. Kremer, (D.-Long Beach, Nassau County), is chairman of the Assembly committee; Martin S. Auer, (R.-Syracuse) is chairman of the Senate Insurance Committee. Six senators from Brooklyn sit on the Senate Insurance Committee, indicating a crucial need for Society members from that borough to join in organized efforts to visit these Brooklyn legislators.

Face-to-face meetings with legislators or their staff counsel are the most effective means for generating support and overcoming opposition to the bill. Opposition has surfaced from the New York State Conference of Blue Cross and Blue Shield Plans and from the Business Council of New York State. These groups have presented identical, but unsubstantiated, claims regarding the fiscal impact of the

bill. We have submitted to the legislature documentation compiled by the State Insurance Department refuting these claims. However, the best way to get our message across is through contacts by constituents in local districts. Copies of our memorandums are available to all Society members seeking background information in preparation for meeting with local legislators. □

# Survey, Evaluation Provokes Controversy Over Psychoanalytic Training

The article, "Psychoanalytic Training—In Whose Hands?" by Crayton Rowe, MSW, which appeared in the December 1981 issue of this Newsletter, has elicited strong controversy. The following comments are among those recently received at the editorial office.

## Committee Report

A New York State Society position paper on psychoanalytic training for clinical social workers, prepared by the committee, was approved by the Board of the Society on December 5, 1981. This represents the first such position paper in the history of our profession. It will allow clinical social work to keep pace with psychology and medicine in setting training standards for psychoanalysis.

The administrative director of the American Academy of Psychoanalysis has informed this committee that that organization has decided not to pursue the formation of a national body of accreditation for psychoanalysis at this time. The proposed formation of this organization had previously been reported in this *Newsletter*.

Thanks go to Martin Pollens for his continuing work in negotiating a malpractice insurance package for members. Evidence is now clear that the current social work malpractice policy will not cover the practice of psychoanalysis.

## Follow-up on Evaluation Report:

It appears that the research on the psychoanalytic training institutes included in the mailing of the December *Newsletter* has gained considerable attention. The committee has received numerous favorable comments for its efforts in alerting clinical social workers to the under-representation of clinical social work instructors and supervisors in training institutes.

Special thanks go to Harriet Pappenheim for her work in pulling together the information and statistics received from the institutes. Thanks also to all those members who continue to be interested and active in correcting the inequities which have for so long undermined the attempts of the clinical social worker to achieve parity.

### **Rowe Censured by Freudian Society**

Crayton E. Rowe, chair of the

Society's committee on psychoanalysis and past president of the New York State Society, National Federation and National Registry, was censured by the New York Freudian Society for his article "Psychoanalytic Training—In Whose Hands?" and the committee's "Report of an Evaluation of Advanced Training Institutes, Number 2." Rowe's article appeared in December 1981 issue of this *Newsletter*. The Report was distributed to the membership at that time.

Rowe, a member of the Board of the New York Freudian Society, was said to have 'gone beyond the accepted behavior of a board member' of the Freudian Society and was accused of conflict of interest and of damaging the reputation of the organization. It was reported that no advance notice was given that such action was under consideration.

### **Comment from the President:**

Needless to say, we were distressed and concerned by the "censure" of one of our distinguished members by the New York Freudian Society. That organization's response to Crayton Rowe's project was within its prerogative, of course. And although we hardly applaud their action, we accept fully their right to interpret his work any way they see fit.
